Welcome back to our Bulletin. It's been a while since our authors and editors, Cheryl and Jan, have been able to publish a bulletin. On the Churchfront, Cheryl was one of the two principal designers of our recent historical National Assembly (as well as wearing the mantle of Lay Leader of the Church's Council). And all the while, Jan has endured another surgery and recovery in her extraordinary battle with cancer. Both have achieved success for which we thank and congratulate them. We thank our most Merciful and Caring God for watching over Jan and Cheryl.

As of this writing we have concluded the fifth week of Lent and are about to join Jesus on His Passion Journey. And we will be doing so with far more participation this year. The journey begins with Mass on Palm Sunday, regular times, with the blessing and distribution of palms.

Celebrating the Easter Triduum later in the week, we will begin with evening Mass at 7:00 pm on Holy Thursday. Our Mass will include washing of the feet. This commemorates Jesus' humble example to the Apostles showing them the way to be servants of God. This Good Friday we will be participating in an ecumenical "Walking the Stations of the Cross" with the sponsors, The Good Shepherd Episcopal Church, and other faith groups. The details can be found elsewhere in this bulletin. Holy Saturday Vigil will be at St. Roch's parish in Tampa. And, Easter Sunday's Masses have slightly different times and I ask you to check the details on the first page of the bulletin.

Last year I spoke of our need to be more humble before God and repent our sins. Doing so allows us to experience the compassion of Jesus. This year is no different for we all need to be more humble, more kind and loving to one another. We truly express our love for God through our actions. Our world needs more love — and that love, that peace on Earth, can only happen when our actions express our love for one another. So, as we enter into Passion Week and celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus at Easter, let's do so with a deeper sense of humility and love of God.

The remainder of April falls during the Easter Season which is represented by the liturgical color white—the color of light, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence.








Ash Wednesday



Lent begins with Ash Wednesday (March 2) and ends on Holy Thursday (April 14). The 40 days of Lent correspond to the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness to fast, pray, and endure the temptations of the devil, all in preparation for his public ministry which would culminate in his death on the cross.

LENT: A Season for Fasting and Feasting

Fast from judging others; feast on the Christ dwelling within them. Fast from emphasis on differences; feast on the unity of all life. Fast from apparent darkness: feast on the reality of light. Fast from words that pollute: feast on phrases that purify. Fast from discontent; feast on gratitude. Fast from anger; feast on patience. Fast from pessimism; feast on optimism. Fast from worry; feast on trust. Fast from complaining; feast on appreciation. Fast from negatives; feast on affirmatives. Fast from unrelenting pressures; feast on unceasing prayer. Fast from hostility; feast on nonviolence. Fast from bitterness; feast on forgiveness. Fast from self-concern; feast on compassion for others. Fast from personal anxiety; feast on eternal truth. Fast from discouragement; feast on hope. Fast from facts that depress; feast on truths that uplift. Fast from lethargy; feast on enthusiasm. Fast from suspicion; feast on truth. Fast from thoughts that weaken; feast on promises that inspire. Fast from idle gossip; feast on purposeful silence.

Holy Week begins the week before Easter Sunday. The week begins with Palm Sunday and ends with Holy Saturday. Easter is not part of Holy Week, but is the beginning of the Easter season of the Liturgical year.



Jesus instructed his disciples to bring him a donkey. He then slowly, humbly, made his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The crowds welcomed him by waving palm branches in the air and shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!"





When Jesus arrived at the temple in Jerusalem, it was full of corrupt money changers. He overturned tables and cleared the Temple, saying, "The Scriptures declare, 'My Temple will be a house of prayer' but you have turned it into a den of thieves." (Luke 19:46)





On the way to the Temple, Jesus avoided an ambush where they intended to put him under arrest. Later, Jesus and his disciples went to the Mount of Olives which overlooks Jerusalem. Jesus gave the Olivet Discourse and his prophecy of His end times, His Second Coming and the final judgement.





This Wednesday is also known as "Spy Wednesday", during which Judas acted as a spy for Sanhedrin. Judas accepted payment of 30 pieces of silver for information that led to the betrayal of Jesus Christ. Jesus was anointed with expensive alabaster by a woman in Bethany, in the house of leper, Simon.





Jesus washed the feet of his disciples before the Passover Feast. With the Last Supper, Jesus established the "Lord's Supper" or Communion. Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane and prayed to God the Father. Jesus was betrayed by Judas and arrested and denied three times by Peter.





Jesus was tried and sentenced to death. He was pierced with a crown of thorns. He carried his own cross to Calvary and was crucified. Jesus spoke seven final statements: first- "Father forgive then, for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:46) His last words were: "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." (Luke 23:46)





Known as Easter Vigil when a solemn vigil is held during the night, meditating on His suffering and death, in anticipation of the resurrection. The tomb was guarded by Roman soldiers until the Sabbath ended. After the Sabbath, according to Jewish custom, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea wrapped Christ's body with spices and sheets of linen cloth. (John 19:39-40)

Why are Lent and Easter so late this year?



Christian tradition establishes the holiday on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the vernal equinox, the start of spring.

That means Easter can fall anywhere from March 22 to April 25.

This year, the first full moon of spring—the Paschal full moon, occurs on Saturday April 16, pushing Easter to the 17th.

It is the first Easter on this date since 1960!



Trea\$urer Report for April 2022 From Candy Christensen-Barker, Treasurer

Since it has been a number of months since my last report, I want to share our fiscal year end 2021 financial status as well as what we have collected through March 2022.

For the 12 months ending 12/31/21, St. Francis of Assisi collected \$27,927. in cash donations and interest income. Church expenses totaled \$14,715. leaving us with a net income of \$13, 212. Total assets as of year-end 2021 totaled \$20,676. Our checking and savings account balances totaled \$14,059. while an additional savings account was opened and is reserved for property improvements only, with a current balance of \$6,617.

For the first three months of 2022, St. Francis has collected \$6,341. in donations and has spent \$2,510. in outgoing expenses adding \$3,831. to our bank account balances.

We are in good financial state, able to meet our expenses. With the passing of our landlord and the unknown status of our church's ownership, we are working with the City of Dunedin to determine our future here. In the meantime, the city is happy with our tenancy and does not want to see us leave. Until the ownership of our building and the two adjacent lots is established, we have been advised not to make any more improvements. We will keep you updated as we learn more.




Founder, Dr. Mello is a supporter of our Catholic Church and a friend of our OCC Bishop Michael Scalzi.
