Saint Francis of Assisi Old Catholic Church

During this month when we celebrate the Feast Day of Saint Francis of Assisi let us honor the establishment of our Parish.

The Parish name was selected by Father Robert "Bob" Swick. At that time, 2017, members celebrated Mass at the Veterans Alliance Headquarters facility at the Clearwater Air Park.

In September of 2018, the Parish began its transition to its current site in the Historic Church of Christ Building. We held our inaugural Mass on Sunday, June 30, 2019

On Sunday, February 23, 2020, the Most Reverend Bishop Robert Fuentes of the Old Catholic Church Diocese of Napa performed the service of Consecration of our Parish Home.

We look forward to many years serving the Dunedin Community, growing our church membership, and providing a welcoming worship service to all who wish to visit us in our historic home.



Saint Francis of Assisi

Italian Catholic friar, deacon, philosopher, mystic, and preacher.

Founder of the Third Order of Saint Francis, the Order of the Friars Minor, the women's Order of Saint Clare, and the Custody of the Holy Land, prepared the first Nativity scene.

Patron Saint of Animals, Merchants and Ecology

Feast Day - October 4, 2020



Saint Francis of Assisi--The Patron Saint of our Parish

Born in 1182 in Assisi, Italy, Francis was immediately in conflict with his father. Francis was born and baptized Giovanni after John the Baptist while his father was away on business. Upon his father's return he renamed his son Francesco. He wanted his son to be a man of business, a cloth merchant like him, and not a man of God.

During his youth, Francis enjoyed a rich and easy life due to his father's wealth. At the same time he wanted something more...he wanted to be a noble, a knight! And battle was the best place to win glory. During the Battle with Perugia, he was taken prisoner. After a year in a dungeon, he was ransomed, and returned to a life of partying.

His dream of being a knight was rekindled during the Fourth Crusade. His father provided him with a suit of armor and a horse. However, after a day's ride from Assisi, Francis had a dream where "God told him he was wrong and to return home." At home, Francis began to spend more time in prayer and wept for his sins. Shortly after, while riding through the countryside he came face to face with a leper. Although repelled by the appearance and smell of the leper, he jumped from his horse and kissed the hand of the leper. Francis was filled with joy when the kiss was returned. He viewed this as a test from God...one that he passed!

In his search for conversion, he was drawn to the ancient church at San Damiano and the cross inside. While praying before the cross, he heard Christ on the crucifix speak to him, "Francis, repair my church." Francis assumed this meant to repair the small crumbling building that he was in. Francis took fabric from his father's shop and sold it to get money to repair the church. His father saw this as an act of theft and brought him before the Bishop and the whole town and demanded he return the money and renounced all rights as his heir. The Bishop was kind to Francis and told him to return the money and that God would provide. Francis returned the money and stripped off all of his clothes—the clothes his father had given him—until he was only wearing a hair shirt. In front of the crowd, he stated that Pietro is no longer my father...from now on I can say with complete freedom, "Our Father who art in heaven."

In Assisi, he begged for stones and began to preach about living by the Gospel. By this time, companions started following Francis. His command was to give to the poor, to take nothing on their journey, and to take up the cross daily. He practiced true equality by showing honor, respect, and love to every person whether they were beggar or Pope. His brotherhood included all of God's creations including nature.

Saint Francis did not try to abolish poverty; he tried to make it holy. He and his friars were not allowed to accept money. They worked for necessities and only begged if they had to. Seeking approval for his brotherhood and to preach, he went directly to Rome to see Pope Innocent III, and received his approval.

During the Fifth Crusade, he decided to go to Syria to convert the Moslems. Going directly to the Sultan to make peace, he and his companion were captured. However, the Sultan was charmed by Francis and he freed them.

By the time he returned to Italy, his brotherhood has grown to 5,000 followers. In addition to his brotherhood, St. Clare of Assisi and her order of the Poor Clares followed Francis teachings. St. Clare cared for St. Francis during the final years of his life.

In 1224, he experienced a vision, received the stigmata, the marks of the nails and the lance wound that Christ suffered.

Saint Francis died on October 3, 1226. He was canonized as a saint on July 16, 1228 by Pope Gregory IX.

He left a legacy of compassion for the poor, the outcast and the oppressed that inspires a journey toward peace, nonviolence, and reconciliation. His message is a guiding light for the present and the future. Saint Francis teaches us to renew ourselves by striving to live our life as Jesus did.

The Tau Cross and the Franciscans

A sermon by Pope Innocent II in 1215 inspired Saint Francis to use the Tau as a sign of his mission to preach penance and as an outward symbol of the religious order he founded.

He blessed people with it; he signed his letters with it; marked the walls of his cell when imprisoned.

It has become the symbol of the Franciscan movement.


